

Leibniz Environment and Development Symposium (LEADS) 2020

Berlin, Leibniz Association, March 9-10, 2020

Global societal challenges such as climate change, the loss of biodiversity, food security, addressing social inequalities and preventing and overcoming violent conflicts, require strong interdisciplinary and international research collaboration. Research at the interface of environment and development is often hampered by traditional academic boundaries. New ideas and fresh research approaches are needed to meet these challenges and young researchers in particular play a key role in doing so.

To address research questions at the environment-development interface and to help overcome these structural barriers within academia, the five German research institutes ATB, GIGA, IGZ, ZALF and ZMT have initiated the Leibniz Environment and Development Symposium (LEADS). The aim of LEADS is to foster interdisciplinary exchange and stimulate collaboration on global societal challenges among early career researchers and senior scholars. As such LEADS also contributes to the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development by the United Nations.
